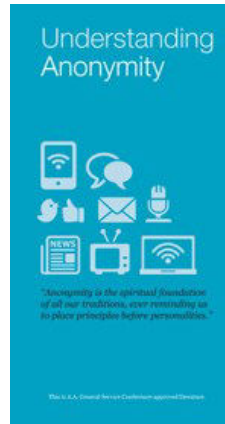
Welcome to the new Panel 67 PI/CPC Committee DCM's

Over ten years in Quesnel High Schools

My name is Clint and I am an alcoholic. I was asked to write about my experience of being in Alcoholics Anonymous and sharing my story with grade ten students in high schools in my community. For the last 11 years I have spoken to teenagers locally. I share my story for a half-hour and then answer questions at the end. I make it clear that I am not there as a representative of A.A. I tell the youths that I am only going to share my experience, strength and hope and they can draw their own conclusions from what I have said. Doing this has played a key role in my sobriety. Seeing the faces of the teenagers I talk to, listening to their questions and being open and honest about my past is priceless. I have a degree from the University of Northern British Columbia and it is on my wall at work. However, it pales in comparison to the certificates of appreciation from two of our local high schools for sharing my story. If you are given the opportunity to share with youth in any capacity, do as A.A. says and become an active member in your community. I think it is part of our role as sober, healthy, happy people to give back in anyway we can. I have spoken to approximately 3000 teenagers. I have students recognize me and say hello, or a parent will email me or call to say thank you. It's at that time when I feel like God is saying thank you by making the hair stand up on the



back of my neck. You have to love that warm fuzzy feeling you get when being in the right place at the right time, doing what you should be doing. It sure beats the dark cloud of impending doom that used to follow me every step of the way. I am blessed to have been given the opportunity, I thank all of you for making this happen for me. A.A. is beautiful and in God I trust.

INFORMATION ON ALCOHOLIC ANONYMOUS (F-2)

This information is both for people who may have a drinking problem and for those in contact with people who have, or are suspected of having, a problem. Most of the information is available in more detail in literature published by A.A. World Services Inc. This sheet tells what to expect from Alcoholics Anonymous. It describes what A.A. is, what A.A. does, and what A.A. does *not* do.

WHAT IS A.A.?

Alcoholic Anonymous is an international fellowship of men and women who have had a drinking problem. It is a nonprofessional, self-supporting, multiracial, apolitical, and available almost everywhere. There are no age or education requirements. Membership is open to anyone who wants to do something about his or her drinking problem.
