

#1. What are Area's thoughts on Naloxone kits in the groups for the safety of others?

Thank you for the question. The Area Service Committee has no opinion on this (as per Tradition Ten) because our primary purpose is to the carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers (Tradition Five). Lastly, groups are autonomous (as per Tradition Four). We hope that helps.

#9. If roundups are considered Special Events under Contributions on our Financial Report, is it normal or expected for Roundups to financially contribute to the Area?

Answered By: Paul T., Treasurer

Great question, thank you for asking!

I can't speak to how "normal" it is for roundups to contribute to Area, but its certainly not uncommon. If you look at the Contributions Report that I publish monthly you'll find in our *Grassroots* from this event, you'll see that since January of last year,

nine contributions were sent to area and identified as coming from roundups and rallies.

Are they expected to contribute? Absolutely not. The autonomy described in our Fourth Tradition allows any group, or even roundup or rally, the liberty to decide on their own what to do with any excess funds. And keep in mind our Second Tradition would encourage the group to discuss and make that decision together.

#14. We have four area meetings a year. Two are assemblies and two are quarterlies. What is the difference between an "assembly" and a "quarterly"?

Answered By: Dean G., Cooperation with the Professional Community Chair

The General Service Representative Handbook states in the section "The GSR's Voice and Vote at Area Meetings": at the Quarterlies, only the DCMs and Area Officers have a vote. The GSRs are welcome to attend and are strongly encouraged to do so, and all have a voice. At the Area Assembly, the GSRs do have a vote and are encouraged to participate as much as possible.
