District 24, representing **Kitsilano** and **Downtown Vancouver**, started up a new PI Committee in August 2014.

...In no time at all, we have grown to 15

committee members and have spoken at five schools, hosting over 30 sessions to over 900 students! We have received almost \$400 worth of AA literature, of which 3 books have been donated to libraries thus far, and the other 38 books to be donated to various locations soon! We also have

plans to donate Grapevine subscriptions to local Youth Centers and gift schools with Big Books and counsellor packages.

In April 2015, our first issue of a brand new Lower Mainland newsletter was created to share the efforts and successes of all active committees here in Vancouver and a 'master list' of contact information

for Public Information Committees in the GVRD was initiated to further strengthen communication among districts. Our committee appreciates the importance of unity and we are grateful for the support of Intergroup and BC Yukon in these initiatives to keep the lines of communication open.


PI and CPC Resources in AA - THE GRAPEVINE and AA.ORG!
