Hello to all fellow CPC Chairs in Area 79!

~Western Canada Addictions Forum~

My name is Sherri K. and I am an alcoholic.

I am chair of a joint PI/CPC committee here in District 71 (Peachland, West Kelowna, Kelowna and Lake Country). I want to share with you, on behalf of the committee, notes and thoughts about the most recent event we attended — the 6th annual Western Canada Addictions Forum, May 3-5, 2019, in Kelowna.

We were invited to present on May 3rd to 200 physicians, nurses, social workers and other medical professionals who deal with people in addiction from all over Western Canada. AA had never been invited to speak before at the forum. A member of the organizing committee for the forum attended our CPC luncheon last October and liked what she saw and heard enough to add us to the roster of the forum.

An awful lot of legwork was done to ensure that our attendance would not be in contradiction of our traditions. As a committee we went through the checklist of questions posted in an earlier edition of the Inter-Com by our previous chair, Steve C., titled "Should AA Attend". We decided all was well and began to plan the event. In a follow up conversation with Rio (past PI Chair and now current Area Chair) more questions were raised about our attendance. So, more discussions were had with Dana (current PI chair), Cathi N (current CPC chair) and finally Racy at GSO. The result was a firm and confident yes, we could attend.

Our preparations for the event were truly a committee effort. We hosted a workshop open to anyone in our district who was interested, but really offered to the four panel members who would be fielding questions from the forum attendees. Our panel was two women, two men in varying ages and years of sobriety. We read the pamphlet "Speaking at Non-AA Meetings", discussed traditions, dress code, appropriate language and answers to commonly asked questions.

One longtime committee member prepared her personal story and we all helped edit and refine her message. The introduction to AA was given by me, and again the committee helped make

We used previous experiences as a basis preparing for the forum. It turns out the setting was very different! We were on a brightly lit, raised stage with the audience in near total darkness. We were given 40 minutes to present and were told we would be cut off at exactly the 40-minute mark, which we were ...

All went well, and interestingly enough, there were several audible gasps from the audience when we were first introduced by the MC as members of Alcoholics Anonymous. We were only able to answer a few questions from the audience due to the time allotted. Again, they varied greatly from what we have come to expect from our other presentations. The panel was amazing in their thoughtful responses! Two of the four questions dealt with Safety in the Rooms of AA concerns. We were able to bring to light several key points about sponsorship, traditions and that the unfortunately underinformed opinion of one member certainly does not reflect the ideals of AA.

We left small packages of literature, making good use of the free pamphlets from GSO and about one in four forum attendees went home with more information. We are very hopeful that the professionals we presented to are more confident to begin a conversation with their patients/ clients who might be struggling with a drinking problem, and that they would refer that patient to AA, having seen our presentation. We were sober living examples of the Big Book and all our preparation was worth it!

I am humbled by the hours of time put in by this committee; together we did what I alone could never have accomplished.


