

■ First-ever Special Online Forum for Deaf Alcoholics Responds to Expressed Need in the Fellowship

The new special forum gives deaf members “a seat at the table”

[Regional, local and special forums](#) have been held in Alcoholics Anonymous since 1975 as an opportunity for A.A. members throughout the U.S. and Canada to exchange information with representatives of the General Service Board, AAWS, AA Grapevine and GSO. Regional forums are held four times a year — each in one of eight regions that have extended an invitation; local forums are scaled-down versions for local communities; and special forums serve A.A.s who have an expressed need, often based on culture, language or geography.

The Special Online Forum for Deaf Alcoholics Anonymous Members — the first ever held — took place January 17, 2026. The special forum came to fruition through the hard work of Alene R., a late-deafened A.A. member, other deaf and hearing members, and two GSO staffers — Eileen A., who at the time served on the Regional Forum desk, and Kelley C., who served on Accessibilities.

With a sobriety date of July 21, 1989, Alene has a deep knowledge of the accessibility issues that deaf Alcoholics Anonymous members face. “The key ingredient in our history,” she says, “is that we have been ignored and set aside. People decide what access we will have, where we will go, which interpreter will interpret. Deaf alcoholics have so little access to Alcoholics Anonymous that many of them have never participated in a group business meeting or district meeting or an assembly or a regional forum.”

Alene has been determined to help change that. With the proliferation of online meetings during the COVID pandemic, members who are deaf were able

to put together a spreadsheet of various meetings of Twelve Step groups. In 2023, Alene took that spreadsheet, pulled the A.A.-only meetings from it, and created DeafAA.org with the help of other deaf A.A.s.

At the Pacific Region Alcoholics Anonymous Service Assembly (PRAASA) in 2024, Jackie B., from the San Francisco and Marin central office, arranged a meeting for Alene and two other deaf members — Matt M. and Bryan H. — with Chris C., Grapevine publisher, and general service trustees Teddy B.-W. and Carolyn W., who was AAWS chair at the time. At that meeting they discussed how to improve carrying the A.A. message to deaf alcoholics. “Once we spoke with them, the three of us added three more deaf members, Ash S., David D. and Sophia P. It was just like the story of the Grapevine when it was cre-



ated by six A.A. members back in 1944,” says Alene. “We worked with Chris and Teddy for a few months on how to follow the Traditions and get a deaf person’s story in A.A. in an anonymity-protected way. Then we hired a professional Deaf interpreter to copy the story so it could be shared in the visual language of ASL on Grapevine’s [YouTube](#) channel.” Thus, the Grapevine ASL YouTube Playlist was born.

When it came to the special forum, this group of six wanted to talk to people at GSO about the fact

that, as Alene says, “there isn’t any service literature available for deaf members,” which makes it challenging to run meetings according to the Twelve Traditions. Jackie B. suggested to Alene that she send in a request for a Special Forum for Deaf A.A. Community. So, Alene and her team, with help from Penny H., then delegate for Area 58, applied for the special forum, using as a template for their planning a special forum for remote communities that took place in 2022.

As the chair of the planning committee for the special forum, Alene worked as liaison with the hearing and deaf communities and with Eileen and Kelley at GSO. The planning began in fall 2024, nearly a year and a half before the January 2026 forum.

“There hadn’t been a special forum for the deaf community prior to this, so I’m glad we started early,” says Kelley, who now serves on the Public Information assignment. “I think there was so much that you assume as a hearing person that you can do at events, especially online events, which wasn’t possible here. It was really listening [to deaf members], learning what was needed and adapting. For instance, a lot of what was usually shared at Regional Forums was put into plain language, because for many deaf members English is a second language. Keeping it simple, usually using videos, and not speaking while showing them, was important. The cool part was the relay of interpretation. For instance, if I was presenting, that presentation was being interpreted into American Sign Language (ASL). The Mexican Sign Language team was LSM [Lengua des Señas Mexicana], and they were taking the ASL and interpreting it into LSM.”

The special forum was an important exchange of information on the culture, language and needs of deaf members and the structure and services of GSO and the General Service Board (GSB). Deaf mem-

bers shared at panels on topics including “Deaf A.A. Community Culture & Language,” “Is A.A. Accessible to Deaf Members” and “Interpreters, Safety and Inclusion.” GSO General Manager Bob W., GSB Chair Scott H., Chris C., and Kelley discussed the resources available from GSO and the nature of the connection A.A. members have with the General Service Board and Grapevine.

“What we learned is that we might have the best intentions, but we really need to bring deaf members to the table and ask them what resources they need,” Kelley says. “We are trying to get *The AA Group: Where it All Begins* interpreted, and we have a few sections that we started with — the A.A. Group Inventory and the Business Meeting. Hearing A.A.s have all that information, so we know how to run a meeting, but deaf members don’t. The more we get this information out there in ASL, the more ASL groups can remain healthy and thriving.”

Alene feels that the special forum was “a very positive experience and an educational experience for both hearing and deaf members who attended. The impact we want it to have, and that I am hoping that it will have, is that hearing people will start asking deaf people what they need. ‘Nothing about

us without us,' in other words. So, this event was an attempt to allow deaf people to be heard. And for hearing people not to be afraid to [find ways to communicate] with deaf members. Like I'm using a relay service right now [which provides ASL interpreters to facilitate conversations between deaf and hearing people]. You could absolutely do this with any deaf person. But 99 percent of the time, this doesn't happen. A hearing person might ask another hearing person who knows the deaf person and it's all like the game of telephone. We want to be heard, we want to be asked, and we want a seat at the table."

Alene expressed gratitude for the work of all those who helped to make this forum a reality. "In all this planning," she says, "Kelley and Eileen are wonderful people to work with. They were able to learn a lot about us, and I'd like to thank them for all their hard work and flexibility. I also want to thank Area 58 and Area 08 for providing interpreters for service meetings, without which we never would have gone to PRAASA and met Teddy and Chris and Carolyn. It blew our minds that they took the time to talk with us and to have that direct communication."

THE POWER OF OUR SEVENTH TRADITION

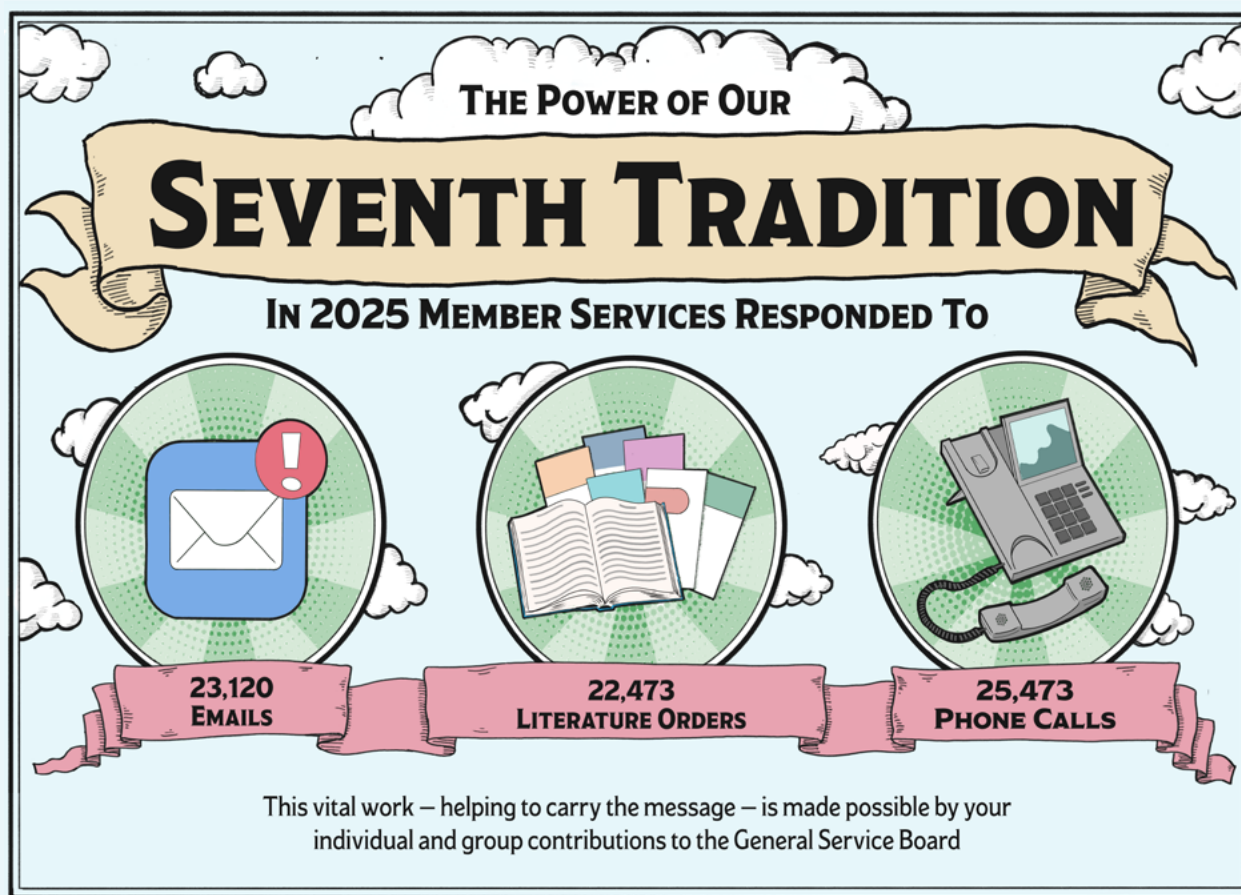
■ An Opportunity to Share Your Stories about the Impact of Self-Support

■ Audio Version of Plain Language Big Book Available Mid-June

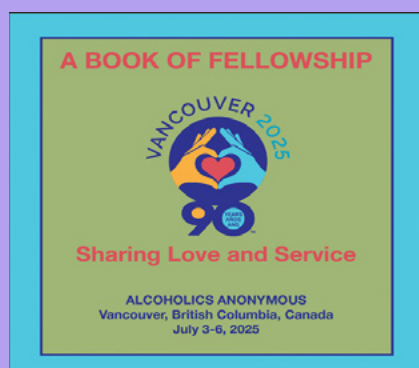

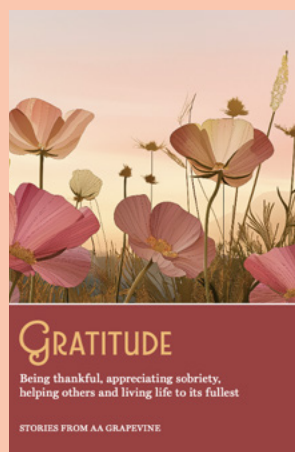
